Agora Borealis

421 Lake Street.

Local Artisan Marketplace offering products made locally, by hand, and often from re-used or recycled materials.

Artspace

708 Texas Street.

Artspace features art exhibitions, interactive arts/crafts events, event venue space, a giftspace stocked by Northwest Louisiana artists.

Aseana Asian Gardens

800 Texas Avenue.

Beautiful space that represents 15 different countries in it's landscaped garden beds.

C and C Mercantile & Lighting and ArtiFact

1110 Texas Avenue.

A family owned Shreveport business of antiques, art, oddities and lighting, plus a creative co-op for local artists and creatives.

Caddo Common Park

869 Texas Avenue.

Downtown's newest greenspace, Caddo Common plays host to art exhibits, poetry readings and live performances.

Central Artstation

801 Crockett Street.

Shreveport Regional Arts Council's administrative offices and a space for art exhibits, plays and performances.

Emmett Hook Center Theater

550 Common Street, at the First United Methodist Church.

A state of the art theatre for concerts, theatrical productions, contemporary worship, lectures and seminars.

Festival Plaza

1010 Crockett Street.

Outdoor venue within walking distance of the riverfront and downtown. The Shreveport Farmers Market, Mudbug Madness and the Red River Revel are just a few of the annual events held at the Plaza.

J. Bennett Johnson Waterway Regional Visitor Center

700 Clyde Fant Parkway.

Exhibits about the Red River past and present. Audiovisual, static and interactive exhibits.

Logan Mansion

725 Austen Place.

One of the last remaining Queen Anne Victorian mansions in Shreveport. Bed and breakfast accommodations, high teas, tours, special events and more.

Marlene Yu Museum and The Rainforest Art Foundation

710 Travis Street.

Featuring the massive paintings of internationally renowned artist Marlene Yu. Also houses the Rainforest Art Foundation established to increase appreciation of nature through art.

Unique, unusual and avant-garde film, art and music venue.

Multicultural Center of the South

520 Spring Street.

An educational and tourist center dedicated to the understanding and appreciation of the history and diverse cultures of Northwest and other parts of Louisiana.

Municipal Auditorium

705 Elvis Presley Avenue.

The former home of the Louisiana Hayride and the place where Elvis Presley first took the stage. Today, this national historic landmark is host to sporting events, touring acts, local concerts and family shows.

Norsworthy-Bailey Gallery

214 Texas Street.

Downtown's only professional art gallery. New artists featured regularly.

Robinson Film Center

617 Texas Street.

Indy films and popular cinema, special events, wine, beer and meals for in-theater consumption. Full menu at Abby Singer's Bistro.

SB Rides

Shreveport area. Offering locals and tourists a unique opportunity to enjoy the history and culture on guided bicycle tours of the City. Call 318-519-0957 for information.

Sci-Port Discovery Center

820 Clyde Fant Parkway.

Fun, educational environment for all ages to learn about math, science and technology. Children's museum, IMAX theater, planetarium and special events and programming.

Shreveport Aquarium

601 Clyde Fant Parkway.

Aquarium featuring touch tanks, experts on hand to teach and instruct and special events.

Shreveport Water Works Museum and Shreveport Railroad Museum

142 North Common Street.

Turn-of-the-century water works, the last known steam-powered municipal water treatment plant in the United States. A National Historic Landmark. Visit the adjacent Railroad Museum featuring railroad artifacts from North Louisiana.

Southern University Museum of Art

610 Texas Street.

Museum of African American art, artifacts, and other treasured works of Africans, African-Americans and their descendants.

Spring Street Museum

525 North Spring Street.

One of Shreveport's oldest buildings, housing a large variety of historical and vintage artifacts from Shreveport. The museum also contains revolving exhibits and a second floor Victorian parlor.

The Strand Theatre of Shreveport

619 Louisiana Avenue.

Built in 1923, this architectural beauty plays host to touring Broadway productions, concerts and plays.
